Highlights of what's going on around our city:

- Water recharge project to direct groundwater to the County gravel pit to recharge instead of it filling out to the Little Salt Lake where it is lost to evaporation. This is in the engineering phase and moving right along. This important project will help bring water levels up in our aquifer and help conserve our most precious resource, WATER! In the meantime, please do your part to conserve and respect watering days and times along with being aware and careful with using culinary water and conserve wherever possible.
- Parowan Bike Park & Pump Track is named, designed (shout out to Paragonah Mayor Todd Robinson for all of his help) and ready to roll! Our naming contest at Parowan Elementary resulted in some awesome ideas and logos. The winner of the contest was Tucker Johnson who named the new park, "Evil Water Bike Park". Thank you Parowan Bike Shop for donating the bike. Watch for our awesome Parowan Public Works team moving dirt and building the new bike park in the coming months!
- Road improvements around town with chip sealing and pothole will start on our most traveled roads first and then throughout Parowan as roads are assessed and improved with our new chip sealing equipment. Thank you Public Works for improving our roads!

Power Outages

Although you receive your electricity from Parowan City, it first travels through the PacifiCorp/Rocky Mountain Power transmission system.

Due to extreme weather conditions and elevated fire risk this season, Rocky Mountain Power has implemented these safety measures.

- Enhanced Safety Settings: These settings are used with devices that de-energize lines when a fault is detected, reducing the chance of a potential fire ignition.
- Public Safety Power Shutoff: The decision to implement a Public Safety Power Shutoff is based on extreme weather and area conditions, including high wind speeds, low humidity and critically dry fuels.
- Encroachment Strategy: When an active wildfire moves close enough to threaten burning into the area of our lines or equipment, they may complete an emergency de-energization of our power lines.

With the **Enhanced Safety Settings** in place the last few weeks, faults on Rocky Mountain Power's transmission lines have interrupted service to Parowan residents.

During a **Public Safety Power Shutoff** (PSPS) PacifiCorp may voluntarily shut down high-voltage transmission lines in areas at high risk of wildfires. This interruption in the transmission system can stop the flow of electricity to your local utility. Customers will experience temporary power outages; the duration of the outage depends on the severity of the conditions.

Preparing for a PSPS helps you better navigate power outages. Assemble an emergency kit with essentials like non-perishable food, water and flashlights. Ensure you have backup power for any medical devices and use generators only in safe, well-ventilated areas. Stay informed by signing up for utility alerts, and making sure your contact info is up to date with Parowan City.

Parowan: Remembering Good People and Interesting Tales By Sandra Benson

In 1993, Vern Mortensen, Parowan native, was a spry 86~ year-old man, good father with a large family, good husband, hard worker, and an author of a book of cowboy poetry and the novel "The Making of a Cowboy." On the occasion of Parowan's 142nd birthday, Vern sat down and reminisced with Bill McClure, Staff Writer for *Paro*wan's Birthday Edition TAB-LOID. The publication was released on Jan. 11, 1993. Mr. McClure asked about Vern's boyhood, growing up in Parowan. This old man knew his roots were firmly planted in this town and in western culture. He sought, in a few words, to remind us what had been, knowing full well things had and were continuing to change. Herein is the outcome of that interview with a few changes to accommodate space. Nothing of substance is lost and I found it most enjoyable.

"I remember as a youngster running down to the fence along the west side of my dad's place to watch the cattle trail drive come through. Dad's place was near what is now the south interchange on I-15 (at the end of Holyoak Lane). The foreman or trail boss was usually on the point and he'd ride along on the fence and tell us kids to tie up the dogs behind the fence so they wouldn't get trampled or cause the cattle to stampede."

Mortensen said the herds were made up of range cattle, small and scrubby. "They'd never seen a fence and got spooked if they got near one. "They were all horned," he said.

He went on to explain the drives usually came through in June. The average herd was about 1,500 head. Each cowboy had three horses for the drive. He would ride each a half day so each horse would have every other day off.

Vern said most of the drives went through Indian Peak to Grand Junction, Colorado, but some went north toward Provo and Salt Lake City.

"When the cowboys came back through, a couple of months later after selling their cattle, they would have only one horse each, the other two having been sold with the cattle. I always thought that was interesting," he said.

"Another thing not too many people know about is Parowan was once famous for its saddles. They were made at PUMI - the Parowan United Mercantile In-stitution. And they were made just like Henry Ford's Model A Ford - One model, and they were all black."

Mortensen says he doesn't know the name of the saddle makers, but they used leather from the local tannery. The saddle trees were rawhide-covered Aspen wood that had been logged in the Parowan mountains. "I don't know why but they used either trees with a right twist or a left twist, he said. Usually, all the materials except the hardware came from this area."

"The only modifications to the basic design was the cinch pattern. They came in centerfire, rim-fire, or double-fire. The cowboys coming through with the herds bought the saddles. A few were taken to Nevada and sold there too."

Mortensen then said, "The most significant change in the

valley over the years was the switch from cattle to sheep raising. That happened in about 1922. Between the cattle owned by Parowan ranchers, and the trail herds that came through the valley, the mountain pastures got overgrazed. That's when the Larkspur showed up in the mountain meadow - and Larkspur will kill cattle. So that's when most of the people in the valley went to the forest service and traded their cattle grazing permits for sheep permits," he said.

Vern, throughout his life, rode horses, participated in the Red Hills Wranglers Club, and told and retold tales of by-gone days. In the original article, he's pictured with a 1st place trophy won in 1953 by him and several other local cowboys at the Utah State Fair. The interview was finished with Vern declaring his love for his wife, Metta, and his horse, Judy, long since gone. Vern passed not long after this interview, perhaps riding into the sunset on Judy and Metta close at hand.

Note: When we purchased a U.S. Road Map a number of years ago there was a listing of "must have souvenirs" for each state. Bob Ray Saddles located in Parowan, Utah was the recommended souvenir for Utah.
