As school gets back into session we at the Parowan Police Department want to give you a little refresher course with safety tips for

those walking and/or driving in school zone areas. These are great tips for kids and parents alike. We are in this together, so let's all be safe together!

Walking Safety Tips

- Be predictable. Follow the rules of the road and obey signs and signals.
- Walk on sidewalks whenever they are available.
- If there is no sidewalk, walk facing traffic and as far from traffic as possible.
- Keep alert at all times; don't be distracted by electronic devices that take your eyes (and ears) off the road.
- Whenever possible, cross streets at crosswalks or intersections, where drivers expect pedestrians. Look for cars in all directions, including those turning left or right.
- If a crosswalk or intersection is not available, locate a well-lit area where you have the best view of traffic. Wait for a gap in traffic that allows enough time to cross safely; continue watching for traffic as you cross.
- Never assume a driver sees you. Make eye contact with drivers as they approach to make sure you are seen.
- Be visible at all times.
- Watch for cars entering or exiting driveways, or backing up in parking lots.

Driving Safety Tips

- Look out for pedestrians everywhere, at all times.
- Safety is a shared responsibility.

- Use extra caution when driving in hard-to -see conditions, such as bad weather.
- Slow down and be prepared to stop when turning or otherwise entering a crosswalk.
- Yield to crossing guards and or pedestrians in crosswalks and stop well back from the cross-walk to give other vehicles an opportunity to see the crossing guard and crossing pedestrians so they can stop too.
- Never pass vehicles stopped at a crosswalk. There may be people crossing that you can't see.
- Follow the speed limit, especially when pedestrians are present.
- Follow slower speed limits in school zones and in neighborhoods where children are present.
- Be extra cautious when backing up pedestrians can move into your path.

A Message from PAAL Parowan Animal Assistance League

Are you thinking about getting a dog? It is a very big decision for anyone. A dog is a 10 to 20 year commitment depending on the breed. Think about what you are looking for in a dog and what breed would be best for you. Don't just take home a puppy because it is cute. Many of these dogs end up in shelters because people don't realize the commitment it involves.

Puppies take a lot of time and energy to train. Dogs can be expensive. They need shots regularly; they need to be spayed or neutered and have occasional dental work. And then there are always the unexpected vet visits.

If there are children in the home vou should consider what breed would be best for your family. If possible, have the dog meet the children before you take it home. And children should be taught how to treat the dog. Training classes are very important for dogs and owners. You learn how to train your dog and it will also socialize the dog. Your dog is part of your family. Treat them as such. They need love and affection and they will give it back. The most common reason for surrendering a dog is the family does not have time for them. Think about that before getting one. And if you find you cannot keep your dog please do not dump them off somewhere. This is a big problem here in Parowan. PAAL will help you rehome your dog.

The Parowan Cemetery: Boundaries Expanded 3rd Edition 1940's to Present

Upon the completion of the W.P.A. project that replaced the wooden fencing with a rock wall around the cemetery (1939 ~40) and the installation of wa~ ter that established lawns and resulted in the removal of dirt mounds on graves, the cemetery appears to have been managed primarily by a City Cemetery Board (committee). Having searched city council minutes, there are few references concerning the cemetery beyond the Cemetery Board reporting to the Council recommending the raising of burial fees or requesting seasonal help.

In the early 1960's, every other road between the three established sections was closed; new cemetery plots were then made available. Today, grave sites dating in the 1960's to the present are seen nestled between graves dating from the 19th century through the first half of the 20th century. Close observation reveals this oddity; the headstones produced by local pioneer stone-cutters/carvers are flanking the newer, manufactured monuments found primarily in the middle of the sections.

In 1980 the south side of the cemetery, previously inhabited by cedar and juniper trees and a good many clumps of sagebrush, was opened for burial expansion.

Also, in the 1998 Dan Evans, son of Clefford Evans (who was the local foreman for the W.P.A. rock wall project), took on the philanthropic task of financing the rock building just south of the arch entry. This building houses technology, referencing all burials in the cemetery. It also provides restrooms. Architect for the building was Robert Mercer and the structure was built by Larry Pendleton's construction company. Mr. Evans, Mr. Mercer, and Mr. Pendleton all claim first arrival ancestors.

When additional space was still needed in the early 21st century, the rock wall on the south that ran east and west, enclosing the cemetery, was dismantled and the materials were used to build pillars to lengthen the wall running north and south with wrought iron posts being placed between the pillars. The work was done by another descendant of pioneer stock, John Orton and the Orton Construction Co. The project greatly expanded the confines of the cemetery. Grass and many trees surround this addition. The Parowan Shade Tree Committee was involved in this endeav~ or. All of these efforts reflect community pride and respect for this hallowed ground.

And into the Future

Of late, a number of our residents have seen additional activity in and around the cemetery and are wondering about future plans. Having had a recent conversation with the Parowan City Manager, Cleve Matheson, some of those questions have been answered.

Mr. Matheson has a computerized mock-up of additional work that will be done on the

cemetery wall. The City has obtained a grant to expand the wall north and east of the arch, making the exterior fence similar to that which is on the southern expansion. The grant is hoped to provide money in excess of \$100,000 with matching funds provided by the city. Much of the city's contribution will be in-kind labor. The future wall will result in the removal of the existing chain link fence on the north. There will be pillars much like those on the expanded south fence with wrought iron posts between the pillars. The pillars on the north will have a cap-stone. The interior rock wall that is now running east and west on the north side will remain. There is a plan for a walking path with planted shrubbery north of that interior rock wall. It is intended to provide an additional place for personal contemplation.

It has been determined that the Valentine Peak trail will have a trail-head down in the fairgrounds area rather than inside the cemetery. That trail will take a southeast direction and will hook-up with the existing Valentine Peak Trail east of the cemetery.

This completes an historic sketch of the establishment of our iconic Parowan City Cemetery. In future editions I'd like to thematically tell the stories of some of the residents. There are countless tales of patriots, sacrifice, courage, heartache and endurance. There are also stories of accomplishments, vision, faith and joy. A principle often taught in my classroom was my firm belief that if we maintain a bridge between ourselves and our past we have the keys to build a better future (the gospel according to Sandra).
