From January 9th, 1931 by former Parowan Mayor, Albert E. Adams

That the people in Parowan should pause in their activities to celebrate the birthday of their community, and to pay homage to the memory of those sturdy pioneers of 1851 who came and founded it, seems fitting and proper and in harmony with the sentiment and feelings of its citizens.

THEREFORE, I, Albert E. Adams, mayor of Parowan City, hereby designate and proclaim Tuesday, January 13th a holiday for this purpose, and I urge that all citizens observe it in a fitting manner, by meeting together and participating in the program which has been arranged with the Daughters of the Pioneers in extending to the people of our neighboring communities, an invitation to join us in this celebration.

The original Brian Head Peak Overlook Shelter was built in 1934. It was a CCC (Civilian Conservation Corps) project, originally subbed out for construction to two individuals, Deb Mortensen and Charles Burton.

Deb Mortensen was a master stone mason and Charles Burton was a local sheep rancher who owned property adjacent to "The Monument." Both from Parowan, together they contracted with CCC Camp # 1966, also known as "Subcamp F-16" to build the pavilion on Brian Head Peak.

The F-16 CCC's main encampment was at Zion National Park. Because of the proposed monument's high elevation, a sub camp was stationed at Duck Creek during the summer months and at Zion in the winter months. The F-16 camp at Duck Creek was responsible for the construction of the ranger station and improvements at Duck Creek and the dike in Navajo Lake.

Part of the F-16 camp was stationed at Cedar Breaks at a meadow known as "South House" which is a meadow east of Sunset View in Cedar Breaks National Monument. This group of men of the F-16 were responsible for building the Ranger Station, the old Visitors Center, and the old Lodge at Cedar Breaks. An accomplishment which they are also proud of was the fencing of the entire Cedar Breaks Monument on the plateau, top of the amphitheater. The crew consisted of 50 men and two foremen, who cut 4,932 cedar posts at Zion National Park in the winter months. They then hauled the posts to Cedar breaks in the summer, and fenced the park known as Cedar breaks National Monument in a period of two months.

The fence was built to keep livestock from grazing in the monument; an agreement that the Park Service made with the Forest Service.

Livestock grazed the area prior to the formation of the new Cedar Breaks National Monument. As part of the livestock mens' grazing allotments with the Forest Service, the Park Service agreed to fence and maintain the fence in perpetuity.

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Deb Mortensen and Charles Burton were contracted under the CCC program to construct the Pavilion on top of Brian Head Peak. This peak was known by the locals as "The Monument" or "Monument Peak."

As stated. Deb Mortensen was a master craftsman-stonemason and Charles Burton was a local sheep rancher. Both were lifelong residents of Parowan, whose families were among the original settlers of Parowan. It is interesting to note that the two men constructed the Pavilion before there was a road to the site of the Peak. They used draft horses and drag skids in transporting materials to the site to build the Pavilion. The sled, known as a drag skid, was made by fastening a pole on each side of the draft horse to the harness tugs and securing them together at the bottom to form a sled. This allowed them to transport water, mortar, lumber, logs, shingles, mails, and other supplies to the site to construct the Pavilion.

They also used pack horses to carry supplies to the construction site. Rock that was available on site was used in the construction of the Pavilion. The two men cut timber in the area for poles to make trusses and scaffolding for the structure; lumber for roof sheeting came from local sawmills.

Deb Mortensen and Charles Burton camped in Skunk Hollow, at Skunk Springs, which is in a draw just below the Monument to the south and east. Skunk Springs was on property owned by Charles Burton. The spring supplied the water for the project.

Charles Burton took the job to subsidize his sheep operation cash flow needs, as this was during the Great Depression.

His cousin and business partner Mark Gudmundsen, took care of the sheep while Charles worked on the project during the summer months.

Later, CCC Camp F-16 was responsible for constructing the road to "The Monument." This road was constructed after the Pavilion was built . (cont. on page 5)



Note: The Monument Pavilion's roof was blown off and the structure badly damaged by severe weather in recent months. The Monument has been such an icon, truly being "On top of the world" (at least our world). However, there is a good deal of talk about repairs and reconstruction. One can only hope such a project progresses beyond talk.

A Tale as to how Brian Head Peak got Named: Part of David Burton's family Lore

One summer, while at the Adams Family Ranch, originally known as Little Ireland, Miriam Adams Gudmunsen, who was my Grandmother Miriam (Minnie) Adams Burton's sister, looked up at the Peak to the north of Little Ireland Homestead. This Peak was known at that time as "Monument Peak" or "The Monument," She exclaimed, "That looks like Ol' William Jenings Bryan's craggy old head." William Jennings Bryan was bald! And from this moment, she named the Peak "Bryan Head" in honor of that image. William Jennings Bryan was a statesman and three time contender for President of the United States in the late 1800's and early 1900's.

Having this formally engineered allows for grant applications to continue for every aspect of the project which will provide the possibility for higher paying jobs and career options for Parowan residents. Additionally, new hangers, commercial and manufacturing lots are planned which will add to economic opportunity now and in the years to come. Fingers crossed as we apply for grants as our new airport road is a big money project as the old road must be replaced and is a high priority for the city.

A sustainable citywide water recharge project is in the final planning phase with significant costs secured through multiple grant awards and teamwork necessary to fund this needed and critical project.

A year of coordinated design and planning meetings have resulted in engineering documents that include a new diversion structure, mechanical gate, settling area and miles of underground pipeline-one going west from Hwy 143 down 300 S to 100 W and additionally a pipe line to approximately 50 N across the Fairgrounds that will carry our overflow rainwater into the Iron County gravel pit on 300 E. Once there, the water will filter through the natural gravel layers and sink into the earth to recharge our Parowan Valley aquifer instead of going to waste at the Little Salt Lake where it evaporates and gets carried away in the clouds. This project is critical to the future water security of Parowan and has been supported through collaboration of the canal companies, Parowan City, Parowan Pumpers and other vested entities. Plans for construction are winter of 2025 for this critical and necessary water conservation project.

Our Parowan bridge on Old Hwy 91 has been funded and is in the design stage which will allow the bridge to remain in its current, historic location. Due to the complexity of the multiple utilities and infrastructure located throughout that area, the project will now begin in winter 2025. This is a win-win for Parowan residents as the bridge will not only withstand a 100-year flood, but is also improved with a protected pedestrian crossing for safety and inclusion in our future trails system as part of our Active Transportation Plan.

Power outages have been minimal so far this winter with more improvements ahead as the lines are "hardened" and Parowan is switched to a new transmission line in the coming months. These changes will not only increase the reliability of our power but will also increase our efficiency as we are isolated on a line that feeds only Parowan and Brian Head and eliminates much of the issues with weather, wind and fire associated with the valley and farms located along I-15. We appreciate your patience as we work through the nationwide power grid issues by maintaining our independence through providing power generated by Parowan Power and delivered through Rocky Mountain Power lines.

We recognize that Parowan City Power in cooperation with Rocky Mountain Power is doing a fantastic job serving our community in a less-than-optimal power environment with more sustainable power solutions in the works, always with the priority of providing reliability at the best available rates. Additional Updates:

- The Recreation, Arts and Parks (RAP) committee will meet early in 2025 for the first time to assess available funds and receive applications to allocate this new funding source for maintenance & improvements of our parks, trails, theater and arts programs.
- The new gymnasium/ cafeteria at Parowan High School is under construction and will offer an additional facility for Parowan City recreational programs and is set for completion by fall 2025.
- Beginning Renovations on the Old Rock Church and Parowan Library were completed. Thanks to generous donations and volunteer hours we are on our way to improving and better maintaining our public buildings.
- A new roof was completed on our Library Park Pavillion
- Extended asphalt and curb and gutter were completed along Lion's Park and the Parowan Pool on 300 E with a new sidewalk to come on 200 S planned for spring of 2025.
- Extensive clean out of our Parowan Breakwater "gravel trap" has been in progress allowing our Public Works to harvest a tremendous amount of material for our roads, recharge project, sidewalks and other upcoming projects using our own, local resources at a tremendous cost savings to our residents.
- Phase I of our Parowan Pickleball complex is complete with four new courts. We will be applying for four more courts this year from the TRCC funds in January 2025.
- The Evil Water Bike Park for all ages funded through the Utah Outdoor Recreation Grant is taking shape with an overlook pavilion and shade structure, training course and pump track planned for completion in summer of 2025! Shout out to Parowan Public works for their hard work on this exciting recreation amenity and one of our future trailheads for expansion of our Parowan Evil Water trail system.
- Several new City plans and updates have been completed and adopted including a Master Transportation Plan, Master Drainage Plan and a Power Rate Study.

 Plans still in progress are a FEMA flood channel study, a Master Water/Sewer Plan, Master Airport Plan along with an Iron County initiated Public Safety District feasibility study.

These guiding documents allow Parowan City to move forward with important infrastructure and future facility planning that give the city the ability to pursue the necessary funding and assistance to accomplish these projects for Parowan. Having these plans complete is the first step for needed upgrades and projects that will strengthen and update Parowan's water, sewer, power, roads, parks, sidewalks and trails as we continue to work together to pursue the best use of resources and technology to enhance and stabilize resident and business utilities and other critical infrastructure.

There is not a day that goes by that we don't all enjoy and appreciate the efforts of our dedicated Parowan City employees and residents who are committed to keeping Parowan the beautiful, little town we are blessed to share. Parowan is Parowan because of the people who live, visit and work here; our people truly are our greatest asset. All the best to you and yours for the coming year. May it be filled with peace, health, prosperity and joy in relationships with family, neighbors and friends.
